

# White Peacock

White Peacocks are uncommon in Alabama and are currently documented only in Baldwin and Mobile Counties. They move into Alabama from Florida in late summer and persist until freezing weather occurs. They are typically found in wet, sunny, open areas. Flight is low to the ground with rapid wing beats and short glides. Both sexes nectar from a variety of flowers.

- Sexes are very similar. Females are slightly larger and have broader wings.
- Not typically confused with any other species.
